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



cooperatives are defined as autonomous associations of people united voluntarily to meet their common economic, social and cultural needs and aspirations through a jointly owned and democratically-controlled enterprise. The responsibility of effectively implementing this form of cooperatives and making them people-friendly rests with some important organizations such as the National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC).

Established in the year 1963 by an Act of Parliament, the NCDC presently has 18 regional offices across the country, with headquarters in Delhi. The corporation provides excellent opportunities for cooperative societies engaged in the fields of agriculture, fertilizers, sugar, textiles and food grains.

The NCDC is successfully making efforts to form and promote cooperatives as provided in the directives of the Constitution of India, which should be appreciated.

The formation of the Ministry of Cooperation gave further impetus to the efforts of the NCDC. Under the dynamic leadership of the Union Minister for Home and Cooperation, Shri Amit Shah, the Ministry of Cooperation is continuously working on giving a new impetus to the development of the cooperative sector, strengthening it and making it a model of all-inclusive development. As many as 63,000 functional Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) are being computerized across the country with the objective of increasing their efficiency, bringing transparency and accountability to their operations and facilitating them to diversify their business and undertake multiple activities.


The PACS across the country have been connected with this ambitious project of about ₹2,500 crores, which will ensure that detailed information on important schemes of various ministries is available in one place. The computerization of these credit societies will also promote new employment opportunities and cooperative-based economic development.

Recently, Indian Farmers Fertilizer Cooperative Limited (IFFCO) held its 52nd Annual General Meeting (AGM) in New Delhi. As part of its ongoing commitment to ensuring the financial prosperity of member societies, IFFCO announced a 20% dividend for the year 2022-23, continuing its tradition from previous years. PACS gets Permission to Open 2,000 Jan Aushadhi Kendras



The government has taken another important step to fulfil the objective of bringing prosperity to rural areas through cooperatives. The Ministry of Cooperation has made Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) a medium for providing affordable medicines to farmers and the poor in rural areas.

The government has granted permission for 2,000 PACS to open Pradhan Mantri Jan Aushadhi Kendras throughout the country. With this decision, there will be an unprecedented reduction in the medical expenses of farmers, poor and agricultural laborers in rural areas.

This decision is a step towards fulfilling Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's *"Sahakar Se Samriddhi"* resolution. Union Minister for Home and Cooperation Shri Amit Shah took this important decision in a meeting with Union Minister for Health, Chemicals and Fertilizers Shri Mansukh L Mandaviya. In addition to increasing PACS' revenue, it will also create more job opportunities for rural people.

By August of this year, 1,000 out of the 2,000 Jan Aushadhi Kendras will be operational. The remaining 1,000 Kendras are expected to be functioning by December. PACS have an essential role in expanding public service schemes of the Ministry of Cooperation. A significant decision was made to permit PACS to operate petrol



pumps and gas agencies a while ago. The responsibilities of PACS have grown with the addition of Jan Aushadhi Kendras.

Despite the availability of primary health centre facilities in rural areas, medicines have always been quite expensive. Cheap medicines are available for the first time in India through these Kendras. So far, more than 9,400 Kendras have opened across the country. It is one of the priorities of our government that even the most expensive medicines should be available at the lowest cost across the country. I have full faith that this initiative of opening Jan Aushadhi Kendra in the cooperative sector will make life easier for the people living in rural areas.

Although medicines were available at 50% to 90% lesser cost at these centres, the reach of these Kendras in rural areas was limited. With the opening of Jan Aushadhi Kendras by PACS, cheap medicines will also be available in the villages. Due to this, the cost of treatment for the people living in the villages will also decrease.

Eligibility Criteria for Establishing Jan Aushadhi Kendra

- The application cost is ₹5,000. Women entrepreneurs, 'divyang', scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, and exservicemen are under the special category. Special areas include the Himalayan Mountain Region, the northeastern states, and the islands. Applicants from specific categories and particular places are exempted from application fees.
- The Kendra will get an incentive of ₹5 lakh (15% of monthly purchases, up to a maximum of ₹15,000 each month).
 Additionally, a one-time incentive of ₹2 lakh is offered as reimbursement for IT and infrastructure costs incurred in particular categories and regions.

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Four Groundbreaking Initiatives to Boost Urban Cooperative Banks

Initiatives to realize PM Modi's "Sahakar Se Samriddhi" vision

nder the able leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, the Government of India has announced four important initiatives to strengthen 1,514 Urban Cooperative Banks (UCBs) in the country to fulfil the PM's vision of "Sahakar Se Samriddhi". The Ministry of Cooperation is continuously taking steps to boost the cooperative sector in the country. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has taken some decisive steps to strengthen UCBs, after discussions with Union Minister Home and Cooperation Shri Amit Shah, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman and RBI Governor Shri Shashikant Das. The scope of UCBs has been significantly broadened by extending various concessions.

The Important Measures Taken by The RBI are as follows:

UCBs Can Now Open New Branches

UCBs can now open new branches up to 10% (maximum five branches) of the number of branches in the previous financial year without prior approval of the RBI in their approved area of operations. In order to avail of this facility, UCBs have to get the policy approved by their board and comply with the Financially Sound and Well Managed (FSWM) guidelines. The RBI also notified a framework governing this aspect for all regulated entities, including UCBs.



UCBs Can Also Do One-Time Settlements at Par with Commercial Banks

Now cooperative banks, through board-approved policies, may provide a process for technical write-off as well as a settlement with borrowers. This has brought cooperative banks at par with other commercial banks now.

Revised Timelines for Priority Sector Lending Targets Given to UCBs

The RBI has decided to extend the financial year 2023-24 (FY24) timeline for UCBs to achieve Priority Sector Lending (PSL) targets by two years, until March 31, 2026. The deadline of March 31, 2023, to achieve the PLS targets of 60% has also been extended to March 31, 2024. The excess deposits, if any, after clearing the shortfall of PSL during FY23 will also be refunded to UCBs.

Designating a Nodal Officer in the RBI

Unlike commercial banks that also have branches in rural areas, UCBs face hardships as they work only in urban areas. To meet the long-pending demand of the cooperative sector for closer coordination and focused interaction, the RBI has recently notified a nodal officer as well.

Shri Modi has welcomed the RBI initiatives. Responding to Shri Amit Shah's tweet on the important steps taken to strengthen UCBs, Shri Modi tweeted that this is wonderful for the cooperative sector and will empower many.

Government Unveils Five Key Decisions to Empower Agriculture Sector

he government has made five significant decisions to realize Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's *"Sahakar Se Samriddhi"* vision for the agriculture sector. These decisions were finalized by Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah in a meeting with Minister of Chemicals and Fertilizers Shri Mansukh Mandaviya to address the sector's needs.

Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS), the lowest unit of the cooperative sector, will implement these decisions to play a crucial role in increasing agricultural yield and meeting other needs. Instead of using traditional methods, modern fertilizers and pesticides can be sprayed using drones. PACS can be employed as drone entrepreneurs. Using pesticides in conventional farming requires more workforce. Using drones will make the process faster and less labour-intensive. Farmers can increase their income and reduce cultivation costs using drones. Additionally, drones can be utilized for property surveying purposes.

The government has taken another decision under which the PACS, which still needs to be fixed as Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samriddhi Kendra (PMKSK), will be brought under the ambit of PMKSK. Currently, under the supervision of the Union Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilizers, 600 PMKSK centres are operating throughout India.

These centres offer a variety of farm equipment and machinery for

rent to farmers. Farmers can also buy fertilizers and pesticides from these centres at cheaper rates in rural areas. Crop literature, soil testing facilities, and information about other government schemes are available at these centres.

Under the Market Development Assistance (MDA) scheme of the Department of Fertilizers, fertilizer companies will act as an aggregator for small bio-organic producers to market the end product. PACS will participate in the bio-organic fertilizer supply and build a marketing chain as wholesalers and retailers. There are about 1 lakh PACS across the country. Based on the mapping, PACS that are not functioning as fertilizer retailers will be identified and encouraged to function as retailers in a phased manner. PACS will be tasked with the marketing of organic fertilizers, especially Fermented Organic Manure (FOM), Liquid Fermented Organic Manure (LFOM) and Phosphate Enriched Organic Manure (PROM).

The proposed plan aims to benefit PACS by increasing their income, improving employment opportunities in rural areas, and providing easier access to local supplies of fertilizers, pesticides, seeds, and agricultural equipment. Furthermore, the plan will also aid in enhancing crop yields.

The NCDC provides farmers with financial assistance through loans and subsidies through active PACS in the agriculture sector. It also meets the financial needs of many PACS that run as mini savings banks. The dormant cooperative societies have also become active now. The NCDC is continuously working to meet the financial needs of farmers, weavers, laborers, women, young entrepreneurs, and those in animal husbandry, dairy, fisheries, and poultry sectors. This has greatly improved their lives.

Emphasis on the purchase of agricultural produce in the interest of farmers

The NCDC is disbursing loans to state governments, state cooperative banks, District Central Cooperative Banks (DCCBs), central and state cooperative federations and various types of cooperatives up to the PACS level. In 2022, the NCDC disbursed a total loan of ₹41,000 crore to various cooperative societies, of which ₹35,000 crore was spent on procuring farmers' produce. The cooperative marketing federations of states like Chhattisgarh, Telangana, Punjab, Haryana and Uttar Pradesh raised huge amounts of money and procured food grains from farmers at minimum support prices (MSP). This resulted in direct benefits to farmers and the rural economy.


Apart from farmers, the NCDC also provides loans to the dairy sector

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for a wide variety of activities, from the purchase of milch animals to integrated dairy development projects linking production, processing & marketing of milk, and working capital for increasing business turnover. Cooperative societies can also get loans for livestock development programmes at easy and concessional rates. During the financial year 2022, a loan of about ₹1,500 crore was म जनमा एव सहकारिता मन्ना

given to cooperative sugar mills for expansion and setting up an ethanol plant.

Shri Modi has reiterated that his government works to protect the interests of villagers, the poor, women, youth and the deprived sections of society. These sections are given special emphasis on the various schemes provided by the Ministry of Cooperation. The NCDC disburses

healthcare, the hotel industry and education, is also given loans by the NCDC on a priority basis.

Special schemes to attract youth

The ministry is encouraging the formation of youth cooperatives to



draw young people to the cooperative sector. Loans are disbursed to young cooperative entrepreneurs at 2% less than the normal interest rate under special incentives. About a dozen schemes are being implemented to take forward such youth cooperatives.

Rejuvenation of NCDC

As soon as Shri Shah took over the responsibility of the new ministry, the NCDC was reconstituted and activated by a 51-member General Council. The Union Minister for Home and Cooperation serves as the chairman, while the Central Cooperation Secretary acts as the vice-chairman. Similarly, a 12-member board of management, headed by the Secretary of the Ministry of Cooperation, was empowered to take quick decisions. The additional Secretary of the ministry has been nominated as its vice-chairman. Nine of its members are representatives of

its General Council, and one member is the Managing Director of NCDC.

The NCDC is headquartered in Delhi, while the remaining 18 regional offices have been established in different parts of the country. Among these, Bangalore, Bhopal, Bhubaneswar, Chandigarh, Chennai, Dehradun, Gandhinagar, Guwahati, Hyderabad, Jaipur, Kolkata, Lucknow, Patna, Pune, Raipur, Ranchi, Shimla and Thiruvananthapuram are prominent. Business activities are conducted from these regional offices. Cooperative institutions in regional offices can receive approval for projects valued up to ₹1 crore. Projects exceeding this amount are managed by the NCDC headquarters. The NCDC activities also include training representatives of cooperatives in various fields from PACS to Apex. Gurugrambased Laxman Rao Inamdar National Institute of Cooperatives (LINAC) is topmost in this area.

NCDC has an ambitious target

Shri Amit Shah has raised the target for the NCDC loan disbursement to \exists 3,25,000 crore over the next three years. While in 2022, The NCDC had disbursed a total loan of \exists 41,000 crore, it has set a target of \exists 1,00,000 crore in the current financial year 2023. Despite this, the Non-Performing Assets (NPA) of NCDC is zero.

NCDC strengthening state cooperations

The NCDC's role is important in the overall development of cooperatives. In states where cooperatives are strong and active, cooperatives are trying new areas with NCDC's financial support. In a state like Kerala, cooperatives are performing very well


Cooperative Societies Getting Benefits

The government is implementing the various rural development schemes of different ministries through cooperatives. National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC) has been entrusted with the important responsibility of planning, promoting, coordinating and financing cooperative development programmes at the national level. It provides financial and technical support for various government schemes to cooperative institutions of farmers, youth, poor and other weaker sections of society associated with agriculture and allied rural economic activities. NCDC is providing funds for such programmes as the formation of farmer producer organizations (FPO), the promotion of horticulture on landless and non-cultivable land, the availability of modern equipment at subsidized rates to farmers, and also for fisheries, beekeeping and animal husbandry. The government is providing huge subsidies for most of these schemes. NCDC is providing financial assistance also to silk, jute, coir, handloom and women cooperatives. Not only youth cooperatives, but all societies are getting various incentives to start new ventures as well.

Steps Taken After the Formation of Ministry of Cooperation

- Grant of ₹1,000 crore to NCDC for strengthening cooperative sugar mills.
- With a grant of ₹1,000 crore, NCDC is able to disburse loans up to ₹10,000 crore.
- Establishment of a Project Management Unit (PMU) to set up two lakh new PACS in the dairy and fisheries sector.
- NCDC gets the responsibility of operating the world's largest food grain storage scheme.
- NCDC's 18 regional offices play an important role in the creation of the National Cooperative Database.
- NCDC to infuse equity of ₹200 crore in the National Federation of Urban Cooperative Banks and Credit Societies (NAFCUB)

in health, tourism and other sectors. More than 20 thousand members benefit from the Uttarakhand Livestock and Dairy Project. Meghalaya Piggery Mission has helped 62,000 members in the state. Similarly, The NCDC has provided financial assistance of ₹4,000 crores in Telangana's sheep and goat farming development programme, benefiting more than four lakh



pastoral members. Under the Karnataka State 'Amrut Swabhimani Charvaha Yojana', The NCDC has provided financial assistance of ₹200 crore, due to which more than 20 thousand shepherd members are happy. Various schemes for handloom weavers under the Ministry of Textiles are also being implemented. Special assistance is being given to the cooperative jute mills of Assam.

The Ministry of Cooperation has also entrusted the responsibility of the formation of the Farmers Producers Organization (FPO) to the NCDC. In the fisheries sector, 1,000 FPOs are being formed, for which the Department of Fisheries has allocated ₹225 crore. As many as 14 deep-sea fisheries in coastal Maharashtra and 10 in Gujarat have been given financial assistance for the purchase of fishing trawlers. •••

He invoked the spirit of "One Earth, One Family and One Future" and urged the agriculture ministers of the G20 countries to deliberate on how to undertake collective action to achieve global food security.

Shri Modi highlighted the difficulties faced by the Global South, specifically the effects of the pandemic and increased geopolitical tensions that are causing disruptions in the supply chain. "We must find ways to build sustainable and inclusive food systems focused on marginal farmers. We must find ways to strengthen global fertilizer supply chains," he said.

Alerting the participating countries about modern farming methods, the Prime Minister said agricultural practices related to better soil health, crop health and yield should also be adopted.

Farmers empowered by digital technology

Shri Modi emphasized the need for the economic progress of the farmers by empowering them with innovation and digital technology. He also talked about making solutions affordable for small and marginal farmers in the Global South (the developing countries of the Southern Hemisphere). During the meeting, the Prime Minister emphasized importance decreasing the of agricultural and food waste while also investing in methods to generate wealth from waste. He pointed out that India is implementing a policy that combines the principles of 'Back to Basics' and 'March to the Future.' As part of this policy, India is promoting both natural and technology-enabled farming.

Indian farmers adopting natural farming

Reflecting on India's commitment the concept of sustainable to development, Shri Modi said, "Farmers all over India are now adopting natural farming methods. They are not using

synthetic fertilizers or pesticides. They focus on rejuvenating Mother Earth, producing 'per drop, more crop' and promoting organic fertilizers and pest management solutions."

He said that farmers in India are proactively using technology to boost productivity. He gave the example of generating and using solar power on their farms, using Soil Health Cards to optimize crop selection, and using drones to spray nutrients and monitor their crops. Shri Modi expressed the belief that this 'fusion approach' is the best way to address several issues in agriculture.

Appeal to encourage the use of Shri Anna

Apprising the world leaders with India's knowledge and experience in the agriculture sector, Shri Modi noted that the year 2023 is being celebrated as the 'International Year of Millets'. He said these superfoods are healthy to consume and help raise farmers' incomes as the crop requires less water and fertilizer.

A software and portal are being developed, which is targeted to be launched by July end. During the meeting, Shri Shah directed that youth should also be involved in better utilization and improved analytics of the portal through competitions to be organized by the CRCS office.

The office of CRCS looks after MSCS in its management, registration, yearly filings, and other regulatory processes. It is also responsible for ensuring that various cooperative societies function under the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act, 2002.

The main objectives of computerization include complete paperless submission and processing of applications, automatic compliance

with the MSCS Act & Rules through software, enhanced ease of doing business, digital communication, transparent processing and improved analytics.

Going Digital Will Make Work Easier

The software being developed will enable the processing of application and service requests through digital media in the CRCS office in a timebound manner.

It will feature several key functionalities, including OTP-based user registration, validation checks to ensure compliance with the MSCS Act and Rules, video conferencing capabilities for conducting hearings, electronic issuance of registration certificates, and other forms of communication.

The initial version of the software is built upon the existing MSCS Act and Rules. However, the upcoming second version will encompass proposed amendments to the MSCS Act & Rules. This updated version will incorporate the proposed changes and improve upon the initial release by addressing any gaps or deficiencies identified through user feedback.

IFFCO Kisan Seva Kendra Runs Successful Pathshala

The central government is continuously taking measures to make the agriculture sector a profitable business and rescue farmers from distress.

Under the efficient leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, farmers are given technical training and opportunities to learn advanced farming technology through cooperatives.

Kisan Seva Kendra of Indian Farmers Fertiliser Cooperative (IFFCO), a national-level cooperative, is one such place. Its Barabanki branch in Uttar Pradesh runs a Kisan Pathshala, which has become a source of inspiration for farmers across the country. In this Pathshala, farmers are trained in advanced farming practices so they can increase crop yields at lower costs.

Emphasis is also being laid on increasing the farm yield in districts with minimum production earlier.

Farmer Uday Singh is one such success story. During his training, he



learned that the remains of banana plants can be decomposed with a biodecomposer and used as rich manure.

It has been scientifically proven that these plant residues contain many nutrients. After decomposing the residue, farmer Uday Singh sprayed IFFCO Sagarika, sulphur bio-decomposer and water-soluble fertilizers on his crops.

He was happy to witness that the production of his crops increased manifold. Uday Singh then told others about his successful experiment, and other farmers of Barabanki also bought ten units of bio-decomposer and used it along with banana plant residues on their crops and witnessed the same miracle.

Manoj Kumar, another progressive farmer from Barabanki, started using the rice transplanter machine in his paddy fields for which he first prepared a paddy nursery as per the requirements of the machine.

He received the information about transplanting paddy through a machine through the Kisan Pathshala. Kumar is the first farmer in the district to switch "Dhap" with the rice transplanter.

Similarly, Nandram Verma also experimented after his training.

Apart from being a reputed lawyer, he is also a progressive farmer. Nandram sowed Taiwanese watermelon seeds and sprayed Sagarika using zinc, sulphur, calcium, nitrate and boron. This resulted in a bumper production of Taiwanese watermelons.

and information. The endeavor of the farmers in the right direction and the usage of advanced technology is increasing farmers' income by reducing the cost of crops, along with

- Handicrafts made by women are sold in major markets including Bhubaneswar's Pipili Bazar.

(IFFDC) under the IFFCO Rural Livelihood Development Project (RLDP) provided skill training to these poverty-stricken women which has now brought a phenomenal change in their lives. Siula is a small village in the Pipili block of Puri district, Odisha, with a total of 396 families. Agriculture and daily wages were the main means of livelihood there. Sudamani Jaina, a woman resident, with painstaking



efforts, got two SHGs Jan Jagaran and Maa Jogeshwari established there. Smt Sudamani was earlier engaged in family farming, but due to severe floods in 2006, her fields got completely destroyed. However, she did not lose courage and formed a small women's group. In the beginning, the group members opened a bank account by depositing monthly savings of Rs 20 per member. Gradually, their savings increased to Rs 9 lakh and the members started taking loans from this account at a 24% annual interest rate.

IFFCO RLDP then extended a helping hand and provided two months of design development training on handicraft art to 26 group members. Purse making, wall hangings, various types of coir toys, and other handicrafts were taught. After the training, these members took out their savings and bought raw materials. Collectively, they started selling their goods in the Pipili market. Thus, they began earning for the first time and gained a lot of self-confidence.

Gradually, five SHGs were formed in the village. IFFCO joined these SHGs to establish Jan Jagran Mahila Multipurpose Cooperative Society. This cooperative soon earned credibility in the nearby market. Two banks, State Bank of India and Bank of Baroda gave a total loan of Rs 55 lakh to further their work, which has already been returned on time. Committee President Smt Sudamani Jaina proudly told that the illiterate women of her village were now selling handicraft products at the national level NCUI Haat and at block, district, and state level fairs and Haat Bazaars. They were receiving continuous orders from Pipili Bazar, Puri Bazar, churches, and other places.

In 2021-2022, through IFFDC efforts and help from the Directorate of Handicrafts, Government of Odisha, a stall was set up for the sale and exhibition of their products at the National Toshali Handicrafts Fair, Bhubaneswar. The group earned an income of Rs two lakh in just 10 days. IFFDC has also contacted Utkalika Handloom and Handicraft Orissa and has arranged for regular marketing of these handicraft products. •••

Cooperatives Driving Youth Employment Empowering India's Future

ndia, brimming with youth power and innovative skills, is writing a unique story of development in the global arena today. Today, we are celebrating 'Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav', marking the 75th year of India's Independence. Young Indian scientists have made their mark in England and the US in the fields of modern sciences, computers, medicine and nanotechnology. Former US President Bill Clinton, during his visit to Bengaluru, praised the Indian youth saying that computer science in the US is incomplete without Indian computer scientists.

India used to rely on foreign countries for technology and modern equipment 22 years ago. However, today's youth is achieving Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's vision of "*Aatmanirbhar Bharat*" by creating successful Indian innovations and effectively implementing them within the country. Under Shri Modi's 'Make in India' campaign, 10,000 startups were launched in the IT sector and 8,000 startups in healthcare and life sciences.

With an aim to empower the country's youth and continue the journey of the 'Skill India Mission' in building the country as the skill capital of the world, young people in India are receiving both skill and upskill training, as well as degree and diploma certificate courses, at colleges, polytechnic colleges, and Industrial Training Institutes (ITIs). The computerization of Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) to make them multi-purpose, the use of software for more transparency, and other such simple decisions taken by the cooperatives of the country proved to give a new dimension to the movement.

Training programmes run by the National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) are seeing increased youth participation. Organizations, willing to realize "Sahakar Se Samriddhi", are reaching out to the youth through various awareness programmes. Training camps are being organized in association with universities and agricultural universities or after signing a memorandum of understanding (MoU). Agricultural cooperatives are giving the youth an opportunity to return to their hometowns, and PACS formed at the village level are helping them establish cooperative entrepreneurship by providing microfinance loans. Today's Indian youth, equipped with training, is not only seeking employment but also creating opportunities for their peers by establishing cooperative societies and embracing innovation.

Under National Cooperative Development Corporation's (NCDC) "Yuva Sahakar" and "Nandini Sahakar" schemes, the work of providing employment opportunities, financial assistance and training to youth and women is done through Laxmanrao Inamdar National Academy for Cooperative Research and Development (LINAC) and its 18 regional offices spread across the country.

In Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand, and West Bengal, campaigns such as "Sahakar Bharti Ganga" and "Sahakar Gram Yojana" aim to raise awareness among people, particularly the youth and women, about cooperatives and provide them with assistance in establishing such organizations. This way, the benefits of various Central and state government schemes are reaching the youth. Thus, the path of inclusive development will be paved, and the "Sahakar Se Samriddhi" concept will be realized.


