

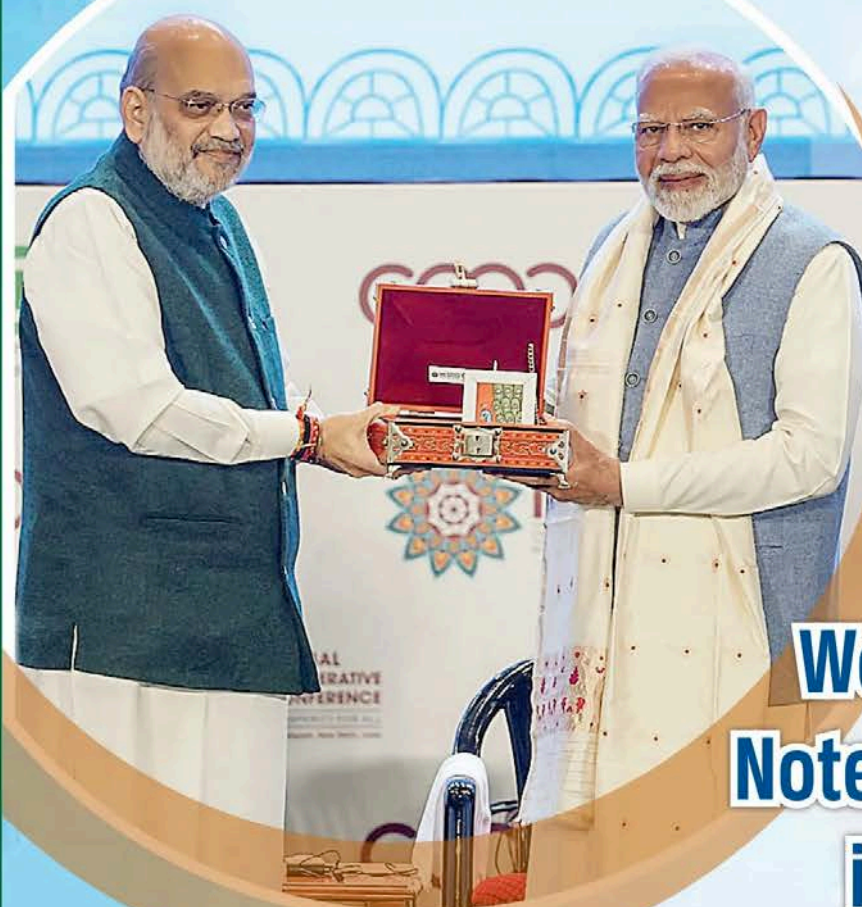

The event saw participation from around 100 countries, making it a significant gathering of cooperation. Over 3,000 cooperative policymakers and members attended, alongside 1,500 international guests. The conference, the first of its kind in the country, was organized under the guidance of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, with strong support from the Ministry of Cooperation, the Government of India and IFFCO.

This conference is expected to provide a new direction for the cooperative movement with tangible and impactful outcomes. The event was inaugurated by Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, who addressed global cooperative leaders, policymakers and members. In his speech, the Prime Minister emphasized that the Global Cooperative Conference would offer valuable insights for Indian cooperatives. Additionally, he officially launched the United Nations International Year of Cooperatives 2025, with the theme 'Cooperatives Build a Better World'. A commemorative postage stamp was released, reflecting India's dedication to the cooperative movement. The six-day conference was organized in alignment with Indian culture, featuring vegetarian meals, Indian cultural and classical programs, and the planting of 10,000 Peepal saplings.

A moment of great pride for Indian cooperatives occurred during the conference when Dr Udai Shanker Awasthi, Managing Director of IFFCO, was awarded the Rochdale Pioneers Award, the highest recognition in the cooperative world, by the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) for his exceptional contributions. This prestigious honour highlights India's success in the global cooperative movement. The team at Sahkar Uday magazine extends heartfelt congratulations to the Managing Director of IFFCO for receiving this esteemed award at the Global Cooperative Conference.

Celebrating International Yoga Day, Millets & Cooperatives

3 Pillars of India's Rising Global Stature

India's international standing has grown due to various government initiatives under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi. Over the past decade, three key areas—Yoga, Millets (Shree Anna) and cooperatives—have gained global recognition and these significant government accomplishments are being widely praised. Since the inception of International Yoga Day, India's yoga system has positively impacted lives worldwide, with its popularity rising both within India and globally. Millets have also gained international prominence in the past year, benefiting Indian farmers by increasing demand for these nutritious grains among health-conscious people, allowing them to secure better prices. Additionally, the declaration of the International Year of Cooperatives has bolstered the global credibility of Indian cooperatives.

In 2014, in the presence of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, the proposal to celebrate International Yoga Day globally was presented at the United Nations Headquarters. The United Nations General Assembly, with the support of 177 countries, approved India's proposal and it was decided that June 21 would be celebrated as International Yoga Day. On June 21, 2015, the first International Yoga Day was celebrated enthusiastically in about 84 countries worldwide. In 2023, based on India's suggestion and in the context of global food security, the year was declared the International Year of Millets. This proposal was warmly accepted by the Food and



Agriculture Organization (FAO). India is the largest producer of millets and given the growing global demand for these nutritious grains, especially for health reasons, their cultivation has been strongly encouraged in India. To enhance the global supply of Indian coarse grains, a coordinated effort was made between various agricultural ministries, state governments and exporters.

In 2023, the International Year of Millets, the focus was on increasing production, boosting consumption, enhancing exports, strengthening the value chain, promoting branding, and raising awareness about the health benefits of millets. The government organized various programs to turn this into a mass movement, aiming to promote Indian millets, their dishes and value-added products globally. Millets were showcased in culinary festivals, international trade fairs, chef conferences, farmer producer organizations (FPOs), roadshows, farmer fairs, cooking training for paramilitary forces and ASEAN-India Millet Festivals held in Delhi and Indonesia, among other events.

The announcement of the International Year of Cooperatives in 2025 is expected to increase global interest in cooperatives. The

organization of the five-day Global Cooperative Conference in New Delhi has provided new momentum to the cooperative movement. India has swiftly embraced this initiative by the United Nations. In 2025, the focus will be on empowering the poor, marginalized communities, women and youth through the cooperative movement. The Ministry of Cooperation plans to launch a year-long campaign to strengthen cooperative institutions and engage people in them. India is home to one-fourth of the world's cooperative institutions and efforts will be made to activate and optimize these institutions. Countries worldwide are expressing interest in adopting India's cooperative model, as demonstrated during the global conference, which will benefit Indian cooperatives. For the International Year of Cooperatives, the government has decided to inspire a cooperative spirit, especially in remote areas across India. Throughout the year, cooperatives will be promoted globally, with successful cooperative models from different countries showcased for the benefit of other countries. India's cooperative model is being recognized and celebrated worldwide. ♦♦♦

World Takes Note of Reforms in Indian Cooperatives

Indian cooperatives took center stage at the Global Cooperative Conference and the General Assembly meeting of the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA). While inaugurating the conference and launching the International Cooperative Year 2025, Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi highlighted the significance of the cooperative sector in India. He remarked, "Cooperatives are a model for the world, but for India, cooperatives are the foundation of our culture and a way of life."

To drive multidimensional development and realize the vision of 'Sahakar se Samriddhi' (Prosperity through Cooperation), aimed at empowering rural India and farmers, the cooperative sector in India has entered a new phase of growth, expansion, and transformation. Inspired by the success of Indian cooperatives, the Global Cooperative Conference and the ICA General Assembly, the foremost event of the global cooperative movement, was hosted in India for the first time—marking a historic moment for the nation.

The United Nations' decision to designate 2025 as the International

Year of Cooperatives underscores the potential of cooperative enterprises in addressing global

challenges. Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, while emphasizing the vision of 'Sahakar se Samriddhi',

stated that the initiative seeks to make cooperative institutions self-reliant and robust. He highlighted the transformative impact of administrative and policy reforms, as well as key initiatives, in revitalizing the cooperative sector.

Drawing from India's centuries-old cultural heritage, the Prime Minister remarked, "Vedas, Upanishads, and other Indian scriptures teach us to walk together, speak in one voice, and live in peaceful coexistence. This harmony is the essence of cooperation and is deeply rooted in Indian family traditions."

Welcoming distinguished guests, including Bhutan's Prime Minister Dashi Tshering Tobgay, Fiji's Deputy Prime Minister Manoa Kamikamica, United Nations Resident Coordinator in India Mr. Shombi Sharp, International Cooperative Alliance President Mr. Ariel Guarco, and over 3,000 representatives and

cooperative leaders from more than 100 countries, the Prime Minister addressed the gathering at the grand Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi.

He dedicated this greeting on behalf of India's vast cooperative network, which includes lakhs of farmers, cattle rearers, fishermen, 10 crore women from over 8 lakh cooperative societies and self-help groups, and the youth integrating technology with cooperation. The Prime Minister expressed confidence that the Global Cooperative Summit would provide valuable insights into India's cooperative journey while enabling global cooperatives to benefit from India's rich experience and expertise in the sector.

Steps Towards a Developed India

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi highlighted that India is

working towards becoming a developed nation by integrating governance with cooperatives. With eight lakh cooperative societies, India is home to a quarter of the world's cooperatives. Cooperatives have a significant presence, covering nearly 98 percent of rural India and benefiting around 30 crore people—one in every five Indians. The cooperative sector is rapidly expanding in urban and housing sectors as well.

Cooperatives are playing a pivotal role in key industries such as sugar, fertilizer, fisheries, and milk production. India boasts approximately two lakh housing cooperative societies.

The Prime Minister also emphasized the notable strides made in strengthening India's cooperative banking sector. Cooperative banks across the country now hold deposits exceeding ₹12 lakh crore,

demonstrating growing trust in these institutions. The government has introduced several reforms to enhance the cooperative banking system, including bringing these banks under the regulatory framework of the Reserve Bank of India and increasing the deposit insurance coverage to ₹5 lakh per depositor. These measures have solidified Indian cooperative banks as secure and efficient financial institutions.

Role of Women in Cooperative Sector

Women play a crucial role in India's cooperative sector, which is a key driver of the country's development. India is currently experiencing a phase of women-led development, and women's participation is expected to be a significant factor in global progress this century. With women comprising more than 60 % of the workforce, many women-led cooperatives have become a strong pillar of India's cooperative sector.

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi emphasized that the greater the participation of women in a country or society, the faster its development. He highlighted that the government is working to

enhance women's involvement in the management of cooperative societies. In this regard, the government has amended the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act to mandate the inclusion of women directors on the boards of multi-state cooperative societies. Additionally, provisions for reservation have been introduced to make these societies more inclusive and ensure the representation of underprivileged groups.

Shri Modi also referenced the widespread women empowerment movement through self-help groups,

with 10 crore women in India actively participating. Over the last decade, the government has extended ₹9 lakh crore in affordable loans to these self-help groups, empowering women and creating significant wealth in rural areas. The Prime Minister stated that this model of women empowerment could be adopted as a 'mega model' for other nations around the world.

Prime Minister Discusses the Growing Role of International Cooperatives

The Need for a Global Cooperative Financial Institution

P rime Minister Shri Narendra Modi highlighted the significant role of the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) on the global cooperative stage, emphasizing the need to establish a global financial institution capable of supporting cooperatives worldwide. He stated that such an institution would empower cooperatives to become ambassadors of integrity and mutual respect. In the 21st century, India aims to steer the global cooperative movement by developing a collective financial model that simplifies and ensures transparency in the cooperative financial system.

During his address at the Global Cooperative Conference, Shri Modi stressed the importance of creating straightforward and transparent financing solutions for small cooperatives. He suggested that shared financial platforms could help pool resources, enabling the financing of large projects and providing loans to smaller and financially weaker cooperatives. He expressed confidence in the ability of cooperatives to strengthen the supply chain by actively participating in procurement, production, and distribution processes.

Shri Modi also emphasized that cooperation extends beyond structure, rules, and regulations, forming the essence of institutions and their growth. He cited Mahatma Gandhi's belief that the success of cooperatives is not determined by their numbers but by the moral development of their members. When morality prevails, he noted, decisions that serve humanity's best interests will follow.

Reaffirming India's commitment to the power of cooperatives, Shri Modi stressed that they could provide fresh momentum for global cooperation, particularly aiding the Global South in achieving their development goals. He urged the global community to explore innovative cooperative models for international collaboration, with the ICA conference serving as a critical platform for advancing this vision. ♦♦♦

commitment to supporting small farmers through the formation of Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs). He highlighted that the Government is organizing small farmers into these FPOs and providing necessary financial assistance to empower them. As

per date, approximately 9,000 FPOs have been established across the country, with the goal of building a robust supply and value chain for agricultural cooperatives, linking farms to kitchens and markets.

The Government aims to create a seamless connection for agricultural

products, utilizing modern technology to enhance efficiency. Shri Modi emphasized the role of digital platforms in transforming the reach of cooperatives, noting that the Government is facilitating the sale of cooperative products through public e-commerce platforms such

as the 'Open Network for Digital Commerce' (ONDC). This initiative will ensure that cooperative products directly reach consumers at the most affordable prices.

Acknowledging the significant contribution of the Government e-Marketplace (GEM) in expanding the market presence of cooperatives, the Prime Minister explained that this effort is part of the Government's broader strategy to modernize agriculture, empower farmers, and integrate them into the digital economy, making them more competitive in the marketplace.

Comprehensive Reforms Strengthen Cooperatives

India envisions a significant role for cooperatives in its future development, and over the past few years, the Government has implemented major reforms to strengthen the cooperative system. Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi emphasized that the Government's goal is to make cooperatives multi-purpose, robust, and focused on increasing the income of their members. To achieve this, the Government has established a separate Ministry of Cooperation and introduced new model bye-laws

to make cooperatives more versatile.

The Government has also integrated cooperative societies with information technology, linking them with cooperative banking institutions at the district and state levels through digitization. These fundamental reforms have enabled cooperative societies to engage in a wide range of

activities in rural areas, such as operating local solution centers, running petrol and diesel retail outlets, managing water resources, and installing solar panels.

In line with the mantra of "energy from waste," cooperative societies are also playing a role in the Gobardhan Yojana.

Commemorative Postage Stamp Released

Following the inauguration of the conference, Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi unveiled a commemorative postage stamp that symbolizes India's dedication to the cooperative movement. The lotus flower featured on the stamp represents the core values of sustainability and community development in cooperatives. Its five petals symbolize the five elements of nature, reflecting the commitment of cooperatives to environmental, social, and economic sustainability. The stamp also highlights key sectors such as agriculture, dairy, fisheries, consumer cooperatives, and housing, with drones symbolizing the role of modern technology in advancing agriculture.

Additionally, they are providing digital services through Common Service Centers in villages. The Government is also working on creating two lakh multipurpose cooperative societies in underserved villages, expanding the role of cooperatives from manufacturing to the service sector.

The Prime Minister highlighted that India is working on the world's largest grain storage project in the cooperative sector. This initiative, led by cooperative societies, involves building warehouses across the country, allowing farmers to

store their crops safely at the local level. This project is set to provide significant benefits to small farmers, ensuring they have access to secure storage options.

The Role of Cooperatives in Freedom Movement

Prime Minister Shri Modi stated that India's freedom struggle was deeply influenced by cooperatives, which not only fostered economic empowerment but also provided a social platform for freedom fighters. He highlighted that Mahatma Gandhi's Gram Swaraj movement sparked a revolution in community participation, particularly through Khadi and Village Industries. Shri Modi pointed out that these cooperatives enabled Khadi and Village Industries to challenge and outpace large commercial brands. He also noted that Sardar Patel used milk cooperatives to unite farmers, further advancing the freedom struggle. Amul Dairy, which began as a small group of milk-producing farmers during the struggle for independence, has now become one of the leading global dairy cooperative brands. Shri Modi emphasized that cooperatives in India

International Year of Cooperatives 2025

Paving the Path for Farmers and Women to Lead Dignified Lives

Union Minister of Cooperation Shri Amit Shah emphasized the transformative role of the cooperative movement in India, highlighting its potential to empower villages, farmers, women, and the poor. Speaking at the inauguration of the Global Cooperative Conference 2024, Shri Shah expressed confidence that the goal of "prosperity through cooperation," articulated by Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, would soon be realized. He noted that the United Nations' decision to declare 2025 as the International year of Cooperatives would be a turning point for millions of poor, farmers, and women worldwide, offering them empowerment and dignity.

Shri Shah reiterated the Government of India's commitment to extending the reach of cooperatives, connecting every village and farmer to the cooperative system. Under the leadership of Prime Minister Modi, the government established the Ministry of Cooperatives three years ago, initiating a series of reforms to strengthen the cooperative sector and ensure its accessibility across the nation. He highlighted the significant legal and policy changes that have taken place to support cooperatives, including the White Revolution 2.0 and Blue Revolution, where cooperatives play a crucial role.

Shri Shah further outlined the government's plans to create trained and technology-equipped human resources through the

Cooperative University, emphasizing the importance of skill development

in the sector. He also assured that during the International Cooperative

Year, the government would introduce a new cooperative policy aimed at taking India's cooperative movement to new heights and ensuring its continued evolution.

Shri Amit Shah praised the exemplary achievements of IFFCO, KRIBHCO, and AMUL in the cooperative sector, noting that these organizations have set a global standard. He emphasized that these three cooperatives serve as models for cooperative work worldwide, offering guidance to those involved in the sector. Shri Shah highlighted the Government of India's commitment to expanding the reach of cooperatives into villages that have historically been deprived of such access. With the establishment of two lakh new Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS), along with Dairy and Fisheries Societies in the past three years, every village in India will soon have its own cooperative institution.

Shri Shah also noted that significant decisions have been made to modernize PACS, making them more technologically advanced and economically viable. He pointed to the formation of three new national-level cooperatives—National Cooperative Exports Limited (NCEL), National Cooperative Organics Limited (NCOL), and Bharatiya Beej Sahakari Samiti Limited (BBSSL)—which will enhance the reach of



Indian farmers to both national and international markets. This expansion will serve as an inspiring example for cooperative institutions around the world, demonstrating how even small farmers in India are gaining access to global markets.

The process of reform in the cooperative sector gained momentum after the formation of the Ministry of Cooperation, which facilitated the creation of a comprehensive database of the sector. This database has been instrumental in shaping informed policy decisions to further strengthen the cooperative movement across the country.

As a result, the cooperative sector in the country has received a new impetus, energizing the lower-level PACS and extending this revitalization to the apex institutions. The Ministry of Cooperation has played a crucial role by preparing model bye-laws for all states, which were successfully implemented nationwide. In addition, the government has worked to facilitate coordination among all central ministries related to cooperation, ensuring that the benefits of their schemes reach PACS. This has significantly expanded the business scope of PACS, creating employment opportunities in rural areas and boosting the income of local communities.

To further enhance the income of poor and landless farmers, a target has been set to establish over two lakh new PACS in the agriculture, dairy, and fisheries sectors. Efforts are also underway to revive old, inactive PACS, while new ones are being formed to strengthen the cooperative network. This strategic approach aims to increase the reach and effectiveness of PACS, making them pivotal in rural economic development. ♦♦♦

Emerging Role of National Database in Integrating Cooperatives in India

Under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, the Government of India is taking comprehensive steps for the overall development of the country and safeguarding the interest of its citizens. Significant and transformative changes have been made in India's internal security and criminal justice system. The government prioritizes providing quick and accessible justice to every citizen. Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah shared these views at the Golden Jubilee Celebration of the 50th All India Police Science Conference in Gandhinagar, Gujarat. He mentioned that through the introduction of three new criminal laws, the government has ensured the safety of citizens and protected the rights guaranteed by the Constitution. He further stated that within the next 10 years, India's criminal justice system will be the most modern, scientific, and fastest in the world. With the full implementation of these laws, citizens will receive justice in any case, up to the Supreme Court, within three years.

Shri Shah said that while India has experienced numerous changes over the past several decades—across the country, the world, the criminal landscape, and policing—there was a delay in making the necessary updates in line with the times. Recognizing the contemporary challenges, the government, under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Modi, took decisive steps to implement new criminal laws. One of the key actions was the computerization of police stations, seen as an essential part of the police system. As a result, all 17,000 police stations across the country have been digitally connected to the 'Crime and Criminal Tracking Network and Systems' (CCTNS), and 22,000 courts are now linked to e-Courts. Even before introducing the three new criminal laws, the government had already established comprehensive systems to connect the courts, prosecution, police, jails, and forensic science laboratories.

Security Boost in Naxal-affected regions

Shri Shah mentioned that for decades, Kashmir, North-East and Naxal-affected regions were considered disturbed areas. However, under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Modi, the government has significantly improved the security situation in these areas. In the last 10 years, violence has been reduced by about 70% compared to the previous decade. During this period, the government has seized 5,45,000 kg of narcotics worth ₹35,000 crore, which is six times more than in the previous 10 years. He added that the government has successfully transformed the confiscation process into a more scientific approach.

Shri Amit Shah further said that in the coming years, India and the world will face numerous challenges and efforts will be required to find solutions. ♦♦♦

The government has renamed

Shri Amit Shah Highlights Robust Role of DCBs in Rural Growth

In a vast country like India, NAFSCOB has breathed new life into the agriculture sector by providing hassle-free short term agricultural loans to approximately 13 crore farmers. The diamond jubilee of any organization serves two primary purposes: first, to showcase its contributions and achievements over the past 60 years and second, to identify and rectify its mistakes. Without the three-tier structure of Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS), District Cooperative Banks (DCBs) and State Cooperative Banks (SCBs), India's farming community, farmers and villages would not have been able to successfully navigate the 75-year journey since Independence.

Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah made the above remarks at the Diamond Jubilee Celebration of the National Federation of State Cooperative Banks Limited (NAFSCOB) held at Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi. During his address at the event, which also included the national meeting of Rural Cooperative Banks (RCBs), Shri Amit Shah highlighted the significant role of district and state-level banks in not only managing short-term agricultural loans but also in supporting collective farming, water management, and various other aspects of agriculture. These banks, along with PACS, played a crucial role in strengthening villages by handling everything from material and personal work to rural development. SCBs provided vital support to these rural-level institutions. Shri Amit Shah

further said that if all cooperative bank accounts associated with DCBs were consolidated into these banks, low-cost deposits would automatically increase by 20%. As a result, profits would rise, enhancing the lending capacity of these banks. He emphasized that under the leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, India is progressing towards 'Sahakar Se Samriddhi', with the establishment of the Ministry of Cooperation being an integral part of this vision.

Union Home and Cooperation Minister highlighted that the White Revolution in India has truly taken place through Amul, with its turnover now reaching ₹80,000 crore, all of which is facilitated through DCBs. He emphasized that this model should be adopted by every DCB to strengthen and enhance their capabilities and confidence. He also mentioned that the profit of SCBs stands at around ₹2,400 crore, while

DCBs have earned ₹1,881 crore in profit, urging that a target should be set to increase these figures. The event was attended by several notable figures, including Union Ministers of State for Cooperation Shri Krishan Pal Gurjar, Shri Muralidhar Mohol and the Secretary, Ministry of Cooperation.

NAFSCOB Manages Agri Loan Accounts

Established in 1964 with foresight by Dr Gadgil and Maganbhai Patel, NAFSCOB has played a key role in guiding and supporting district and state-level banks across India. It is the only institution that maintains authorized data on 100 key parameters for state and district-level banks, as well as thousands of PACS. This data is crucial in shaping the agricultural loan framework for the country and is 99.72% accurate and transparent. NAFSCOB was founded to address and devise

strategies for resolving issues related to cooperative credit, banking and other associated challenges.

PACS, DCBs Win Excellence Awards

SCBs, District Central Cooperative Banks (DCCBs) and PACS that have excelled in the cooperative sector were honoured by Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah during the Diamond Jubilee Celebrations of NAFSCOB at Bharat Mandapam. Shri Amit Shah pointed out that PACS until they were equipped with technology, lacked administrative transparency in their operations. However, after the formation of the Ministry of Cooperation, the government transformed the functioning of PACS, making them more efficient and practical. He emphasized that efforts are being made not only to involve the younger generation in cooperation but also to increase their participation in the activities of PACS.

The awards were presented in various categories as part of the event, marking the 60th anniversary of NAFSCOB, the apex body of SCBs, and attended by representatives of RCBs from across the country. Shri Amit Shah stated that to strengthen the spirit of cooperation, all village-level issues should be resolved through PACS, district problems should be addressed with cooperative solutions and state-level concerns should be handled by SCBs.

Shri Amit Shah emphasized that the core values of participation, welfare and equitable distribution of profits should be adopted by PACS and DCBs. He noted that there is now greater transparency in the operations of both DCBs and SCBs. Currently, NAFSCOB comprises 34 SCBs, 352 DCBs, and 105,000 PACS, with 65,000 PACS actively operating.

He stressed the importance of these institutions working together as a unified system.

Kerala State Cooperative Bank was represented by its CEO, Jorty M Chacko, while Tamil Nadu State Cooperative Bank was represented by its MD, P Loganathan. Goa State Cooperative Bank's award was presented to its Chairman, Ulhas B Fall Desai and CEO, Anant M Chodankar. The award for Andhra Pradesh State Cooperative Bank was received by Srinath Reddy, Managing

Director. Himachal Pradesh State Cooperative Bank was represented by Chairman Devendra Shyam and CEO Sharwan Manta, and Gujarat State Cooperative Bank was represented by Ajaybhai Patel. Mizoram Cooperative Apex Bank, Sikkim State Cooperative Bank, and Karnataka State Cooperative Apex Bank were also recognized. Empowered Women, Prosperous Villages Through Dairy Cooperative Movement

India leads the world in average per capita milk production, a feat significantly driven by the cooperative movement. When dairy farming was first introduced in the cooperative sector, no one could have predicted that Amul would grow into a vast network worth ₹60,000 crores. Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah shared these insights during the inauguration of a state-of-the-art animal feed plant in Himmatnagar, Sabarkantha district, Gujarat, with a production capacity of 800 tonnes. He emphasized that the cooperative dairy movement has not only empowered women but has also fostered prosperity and improved nutrition in rural areas. The seed sown in the form of the establishment of Sabarkantha Dairy has today grown into a banyan tree providing livelihood for over 350,000 families. Women involved in animal husbandry now lead lives of dignity because of Sabarkantha Dairy and its milk business. Shri Shah credited this success to the White Revolution initiated by Amul.

Fulfilling Fodder Needs in Sabarkantha

Union Home and Cooperation Minister Shri Amit Shah announced that Sabar Dairy has established an advanced animal feed plant at a cost of approximately ₹210 crore to ensure local cattle receive nutritious food. This state-of-the-art facility will not only fulfill the fodder requirements of farmers in Sabarkantha and Aravali but will also generate new employment opportunities. Shri Shah noted that

since its founding in 1976, Sabar Dairy has expanded its capacity to produce 2,050 tonnes of animal feed. He also highlighted the growth in milk consumption in India, which was only 40 kg per person annually in 1970, but has risen to 167 kg per person per year by 2023.

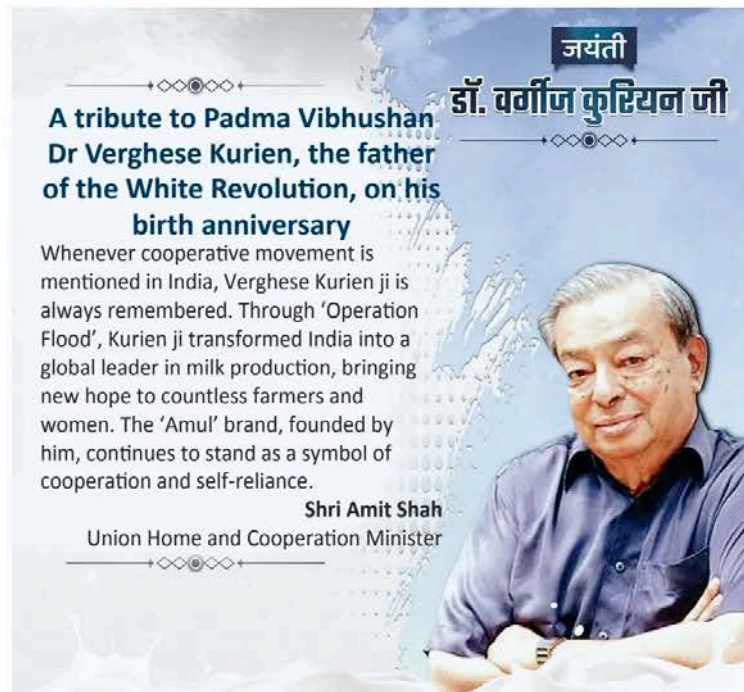

Dr Verghese Kurien: Father of White Revolution

Dr Verghese Kurien is often referred to as the father of India's White Revolution. As the founding chairman of the National Dairy Development Board from 1965 to 1998, his efforts made it possible for all people in India to have access to sufficient milk by 1970. At a time when milk production was low and the population was high, milk was scarce. However, due to the visionary leadership of Dr Kurien, the White Revolution transformed the country, making it self-sufficient in milk production. In recognition of his significant contributions to the dairy industry, Dr Kurien was awarded the Rochdale Pioneers Award by the ICA in 2001.

Dr Verghese Kurien, widely known as the 'Milk Man of India', was born on November 26, 1921, in Kerala to a father who was a civil surgeon. After earning his engineering degree from GC Engineering College in Chennai, he worked briefly at TISCO in Jamshedpur. Later, the Government of India awarded him a scholarship to study dairy engineering, which he completed at the Imperial Institute of Animal Husbandry and Dairying. In 1948, he graduated with a mechanical engineering degree from Michigan State University, with a focus on dairy engineering. Dr Kurien introduced several innovations in the dairy industry, leading to a major transformation in milk production in India. He launched the Operation Flood programme to boost the dairy sector, which resulted in a significant rise in milk production. By 1998, India surpassed the United States to become the world's top

milk producer. As the architect of the White Revolution, he established around 30 institutions, including Amul, GCMMF, RRMA and NDDB. In 1965, Lal Bahadur Shastri appointed Dr Kurien as the Chairman of the National Dairy Development Board.

Dr Verghese Kurien, recipient of several prestigious awards including the Padma Vibhushan, Padma Bhushan, Padma Shri, and the Ramon Magsaysay Award, passed away on September 9, 2012, at the

age of 90 in Gujarat. In honour of his contributions, his birth anniversary, November 26, is celebrated annually as National Milk Day in India. Kurien was the founder of Amul, India's largest milk-producing cooperative, and also served as its chairman. The National Dairy Development Board (NDDB) was established based on Amul's operational model. Under his leadership, Operation Flood was launched in 1970, which became the world's largest dairy development programme. ♦♦♦

Dr US Awasthi Gets Rochdale Pioneers Award for Promoting Cooperatives

Dr Uday Shankar Awasthi, Managing Director of India's leading fertilizer cooperative, has been awarded the highest honour in the cooperative sector. He received the Rochdale Pioneers Award at the Global Cooperative Conference, presented by the International Cooperation Alliance (ICA). Dr Awasthi is only the second Indian to receive this prestigious award. Before him, Dr Verghese Kurien, the father of the White Revolution and Amul, was honoured with this award in 2001. Established in 2000, the Rochdale Pioneers Award recognizes individuals or cooperative organizations that have made significant contributions to innovative and financially sustainable cooperative activities, benefiting their members. The award was presented by ICA at the India Pavilion during the conference.

Dr US Awasthi was presented with the Rochdale Pioneers Award by ICA President Ariel Guarco at the Global Cooperative Conference, which was jointly organized by the Ministry of Cooperation, IFFCO Limited, and ICA. Dr Awasthi began his career with IFFCO as a chemical engineer in 1976. During his tenure, the cooperative's production capacity grew by 292%, and its net assets increased by 688%. Under his leadership, IFFCO expanded into various business ventures and developed indigenous Nano fertilizers. Upon receiving the award, IFFCO's Managing Director, Dr Uday Shankar Awasthi, expressed his pride in the recognition, attributing it to Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi's vision of 'Sahakar

people with her handmade creations for years. In 2015, she established a cooperative to expand her craft. Her handmade carpets and artefacts are priced between five thousand and ten thousand rupees. Gulbahar shared that her artworks have been well-received in India, and she is thrilled to participate in the Global Cooperative Conference. She believes that increased cooperation between the two countries in this field would bring mutual benefits. Gulbahar's work has earned global

recognition, and she explained that creating each piece takes over six months. The higher price of her pieces reflects the meticulous artistry and attention to detail involved in the process.

Mongolia's Jute Garners Interest

Mongolia's jute products also garnered a lot of attention at the event. The Mongolian Woollen Handmade stall attracted significant interest, as the National Association of Mongolian Agriculture primarily produces items made from jute and cotton, known for their warm wool. The participation of international cooperatives in the global conference aims to expand cooperation, create employment opportunities, and strengthen business partnerships, which was one of the main goals of the ICA conference. Betamin, a woman from Mongolia who set up the stall, explained that most of the women in her community are employed in jute work. To bring their handmade woollen products to the international market, they launched them at the Cooperative Haat, providing artisans with access to a broader market. This initiative not only makes their art

more accessible to people but also improves the livelihoods of the artisans.

SEWA Cooperative Empowers Women

The women of the SEWA Cooperative Federation, Gujarat, showcased their stall at the Global Cooperative Conference. For years, SEWA Cooperative has been dedicated to empowering women, expanding the market for their crafts and improving their livelihoods. The handmade artefacts created by the women are being exported globally through the cooperative. These handicraft items are also supplied to stores like Fab India and Khadi Village Industries.

SEWA (Gujarat State Women's SEWA Cooperative Federation Limited) was founded in 1992 with the aim of making women economically self-sufficient. Over the past 27 years, more than three lakh women have joined SEWA, engaging in business through nearly 100 primary cooperative societies. In the current financial year, SEWA Cooperative achieved an annual turnover of around ₹300 crore. Through initiatives like SEWA Artisans and SEWA Rehab, the federation is creating employment opportunities

for women. The handmade products, such as aprons, decorative items, jute wall hangings, bags, door mats and patchwork are exported to both local and international markets. Madhu Sood, the coordinator of SEWA Cooperative, who attended the event in Delhi, shared that in addition to providing a wide market for women's products, SEWA also offers training workshops to help women enhance the quality of their products to international standards. These workshops and live demonstrations allow women to directly access the market, ensuring they receive fair prices for their products and eliminate middlemen. The block-printed sarees, embroidery, and patchwork designed by SEWA women have gained a distinctive reputation. By obtaining craftsmanship certificates, these women can easily sell their products at events like Hunar Haat and Handicraft Fair. Suman, an artisan at the stall, shared her personal story. Having been part of SEWA Cooperative for 10 years, she explained that she used to sew clothes for her local community for a living. However, after joining SEWA, she began receiving more work and earning higher wages, greatly improving her quality of life. ♦♦♦

Indian Cooperatives Gain Global Recognition and Appreciation

The Global Cooperative Conference took place from November 25 to 30 at Bharat Mandapam in New Delhi. During the event, Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi officially declared 2025 as the International Year of Cooperatives and commemorated the occasion by issuing a special postage stamp. Under the leadership of Union Minister of Cooperation Shri Amit Shah, cooperatives have seen substantial growth in a brief period. Organized by IFFCO (Indian Farmers Fertilizer Cooperative Limited) in partnership with the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA), this conference has significantly amplified the global recognition of Indian cooperatives.

Last year, IFFCO Managing Director Dr. Uday Shankar Awasthi was invited to Brussels for a conference supported by the Ministry of Cooperation and co-hosted by 17 other Indian cooperative federations, an invitation which he accepted with enthusiasm. ICA President Ariel Guarco and Director General Jeroen Douglas engaged with representatives from numerous countries to ensure the event's success. Shri Dileep Bhai Sanghani, who serves as both the President of the National Cooperative Union of India and IFFCO, played a pivotal role in making the event successful.

The International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) was founded on August 19, 1895. For the first time in its 130-year history, India was chosen to host the global conference. The inaugural World Congress of ICA took place in London in 1895, and following

that, the event has been held biennially or quadrennially in various countries around the world. However, this year marked the first time it was organized in India. Prior to this, the last global conference was held in the Philippines in 2023.

The International Cooperative Alliance is the premier global body for the cooperative movement, preserving and enhancing the cooperative philosophy through the trials of two world wars. India has had a strong connection with ICA since its establishment. In 1960, India provided a strategic location in New Delhi for the ICA Asia and Pacific Regional Office, which has been operational there for the last 64 years. With the creation of the Ministry of Cooperation by Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the appointment of India's first Minister of Cooperation, Amit Shah, India's cooperative efforts have gained significant international recognition. Cooperatives principles advocate for the development of all, promoting equality and democracy. The global cooperative community has its eyes on India's recent cooperative accomplishments, including 54 key initiatives led by PM Modi, such as the 2023 Multi State Institutions Act amendment, model bylaws, PACS computerization, and expanding PACS into various business sectors, all of which have bolstered rural employment. Additionally, the establishment of three multi-state cooperative societies has elevated India's profile in global cooperative circles. In September 2024, Union Minister of Cooperation Amit Shah presented a three-year report on the

Ministry of Cooperation, detailing initiatives like forming cooperative institutions in Gram Panchayats, and promoting cooperation through efforts like the White Revolution and other cooperative ventures.

White Revolution I demonstrated to the world how to achieve nutritional self-sufficiency, generate employment, and supply global agricultural inputs, thereby reinforcing democratic structures within cooperatives. White Revolution 2.0 is poised to enhance employment opportunities and empower women further, as women now hold significant control over dairy cooperatives in India. India's advancements in animal husbandry and milk cooperatives have gained international acclaim.

The inauguration of the Global Cooperative Year 2025 by Prime Minister Narendra Modi sends a profound message globally, foretelling a period dedicated to the advancement of cooperatives. This era will see cooperatives taking on new dimensions, with new cooperative societies being established in areas where they have not yet been implemented, including urban settings where youth will be increasingly involved. Women's roles in cooperatives will be fortified through self-help groups. By the close of 2025, the cooperative movement we discuss in December 2024 will have transformed and strengthened, ensuring that Indian cooperatives play a pivotal role on the world stage. ♦♦♦

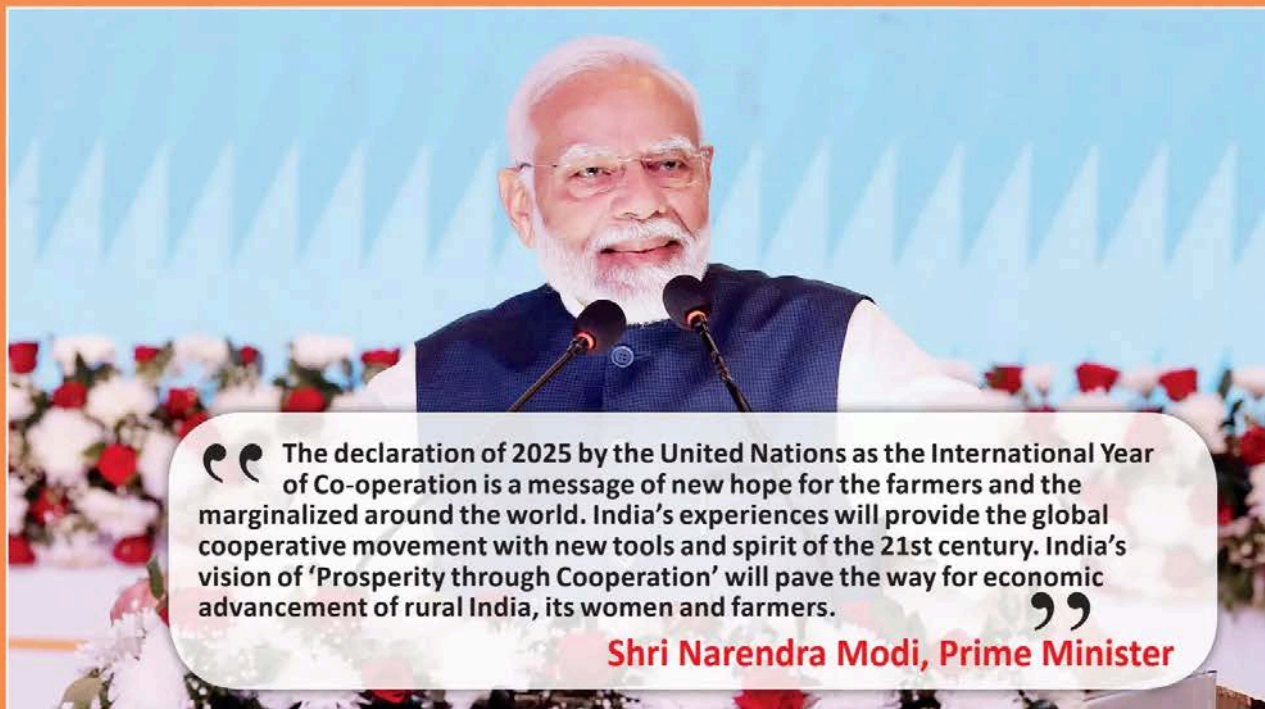
